



## **Please Oppose SB 45 – Don't repeal a beneficial paint recycling program for Colorado communities**

Prior to the passage of the Architectural Paint Stewardship Act in 2014, Colorado communities were paying as much as \$120,000 a year to manage paint disposal.

If Paint Stewardship Program ended today, communities predict they would have to cover the costs again of properly disposing of paint.

The total cost across the state to taxpayers would be \$6.8 million annually.

These estimates do not include the costs of dealing with illegal dumping and waste water processing that will occur as a result of the termination of the program. Many collection sites will have to close and residents will either leave their paint at the closed collection site, a county facility or worse along roads or dump the paint down drains.

As a result of the success of the Paint Stewardship Program many Colorado residents are accustomed to recycling their paint at nearby sites for free. The demand for recycling paint has grown and without the program communities will have to handle the increased demand either through taxpayer funded programs or cleaning up illegally dumped paint.
